

AT ALERT LEVEL 4

- Winegrowers can operate as an "essential service"
- Only essential work can be undertaken, non-essential work must be deferred
- Remote sales can continue, but all premises (cellar doors, cafes, restaurants) must close to the public
- All businesses required to prepare safety plans, incorporating contact tracing, hygiene measures, physical distancing (2 metres is the gold standard, but can reduce to 1 metre in a work environment if needed)
- Outside of work, people must stay home and stay in their immediate household bubbles
- Businesses are required to ensure, to the greatest extent practicable, that people scan in using the COVID Tracer QR Code or by providing a contact tracing record.
- Masks are required in some places, including when visiting businesses or services (eg. supermarkets). In other places they are strongly recommended.

AT ALERT LEVEL 🏅

Auckland is taking a three step transition out of this Alert Level. More information on each step is available on the **following page.**

- Winegrowers' operations from Alert Level 4 can continue at Alert Level 3, with additional flexibility allowed
- Masks are required in some places, including when visiting businesses or services (eg. supermarkets). In other places they are strongly recommended.
- Bubbles can be expanded slightly
- Any work can be undertaken so long as it is "safe" (this includes non-essential work not permitted at Alert Level 4)
- All businesses required to prepare safety plans, incorporating contact tracing, hygiene measures, physical distancing (2 metres is the gold standard, but can reduce to 1 metre in a work environment if needed)
- Workers must work from home where possible
- Travel between regions only permitted in limited circumstances

AT ALERT LEVEL 2

- Winegrowers' operations from Alert Level 3 can continue at Alert Level 2, with additional flexibility allowed
- All businesses can open
- As with Alert Level 3, all businesses must take appropriate measures to protect health and safety (eg. physical distancing, contact tracing etc.)
- People should keep 2 meters from people they don't know in public and retail stores; 1 meter in environments like workplaces and gyms where practicable
- Mask wearing is compulsory in more places, including retail businesses and for people in customer-facing roles in hospitality.
- In particular, responsible consumption of alcohol must be maintained on licensed premises, to ensure patrons comply with the requirements
- People can leave home "in a safe way"
- Travel between regions is permitted 'in a safe way', but with restrictions for travel across an Alert Level boundary
- There is no number limit for how many customers seated at your cellar door, restaurant or café, provided physical distancing and seated service can be maintained.
- Gatherings of up 100 people are permitted, whether indoors or outdoors.

AT ALERT LEVEL

- Winegrowers' operations from Alert Level 2 can continue at Alert Level 1, with additional flexibility allowed
- All businesses can open
- No restrictions on movement, gatherings or physical distancing, but businesses may choose to continue these to reduce the risk if they wish

AT ALL ALERT LEVELS:

- WECS sensory evaluation uses self-declaration at Alert levels 3/4, and for 28 days after Alert levels drop to 2 or below
- Masks/face coverings are required on all public transport and flights nationwide.
- No restrictions on freight (including exports)
- General public health advice applies regarding disinfecting surfaces, handwashing etc.
- Those with cold or flu symptoms must stay home and ring Healthline or their GP for advice
- Keep track of where you have been to assist with rapid tracing if required
- Businesses must display an NZ COVID Tracer QR code for each business location
- Robust border measures remain in place
- Existing laws for alcohol promotions and sales remain in effect

AT ALERT LEVEL 3

Auckland is taking a three step transition out of this Alert Level.

STEP 1

For winegrowers, this step is essentially the same as previous Alert Level 3.

- Cellar doors, restaurants and cafes can open for "contactless" pickup and delivery, but no customers are allowed on the premises
- There is some flexibility for outdoor social gatherings and recreation.

STEP 2

There is added flexibility for retail, but otherwise this looks very similar to the previous Alert Level 3 for winegrowers.

- Retail stores (eg cellar doors) can operate, with customers able to enter premises. Staff and customers must wear face coverings and keep 2 metres apart. We do not expect cellar doors will be able to offer tastings at this step, only takeaway sales.
- There is more flexibility for outdoor social gatherings and recreation.

This starts to look closer to Alert Level 2, with cellar doors and winery cafes/restaurants able to open to customers tasting or dining on

Customers must be seated and kept separate, and mask wearing will be required by staff.

STEP 3
